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

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
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ACTING ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S BIOGRAPHY



RYAN JOLICOEUR-NYE

Originally from central Maine, Ryan Jolicoeur-Nye began his ballet training at the age of 16, working with renowned Kirov Ballet Dancer, Andrei Bossov as well as The Royal Winnipeg Ballet School Professional Division. Upon graduating from Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Jolicoeur-Nye attended the Banff Summer Arts Festival where he performed the principal role in Fernand Nault's Carmina Burana. Jolicoeur-Nye went on to dance for Festival Ballet of Providence, Eugene Ballet, and Ballet Idaho where he was promoted to principal dancer in 2011.

In 2012, Jolicoeur-Nye joined Kansas City Ballet where he danced many principal roles, including Jerome Robbins' Fancy Free, Septime Webre's ALICE (in wonderland), Michael Pink's Dracula, as well as Devon Carney's Swan Lake, Giselle, and The Nutcracker. Jolicoeur-Nye retired from Kansas City Ballet in 2016 and eventually became the second company manager. In 2018, Jolicoeur-Nye was named Artistic Director of Northwest Arkansas Ballet Theatre based in Bentonville. Under his tenure, the company experienced exponential growth, creating more than 80 performances and reaching over 28,000 area residents.

As a choreographer, he has created ballets for Northwest Arkansas Ballet Theatre, Ballet Idaho, Chicago Repertory Ballet, Kansas City Ballet, Royal Winnipeg Ballet School, Moving Arts Dance Festival, and Ballet Des Moines, among others. Jolicoeur-Nye was named "Outstanding Choreographer" at the 2017 Youth American Grand Prix as well as "Best Choreographer" at the World Ballet Art Competition (WBAC) Grand Prix 2019.

Jolicoeur-Nye joined Oklahoma City Ballet in August 2020 as a Rehearsal Director, working closely with company dancers and creating choreography for several short works. In January 2022, he was named Acting Artistic Director after the resignation of Robert Mills.

Jolicoeur-Nye is married to Racheal Nye, School Director for the Oklahoma City Ballet Yvonne Chouteau School and together they have two children who often dance student roles in Oklahoma City Ballet productions. In his free time, Ryan enjoys playing music, painting, cooking, and family time.

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

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THE SLEEPING BEAUTY

PROLOGUE:

Princess Aurora's Christening in the Court of King Florestan

King Florestan and his Queen are celebrating the christening of their long awaited newborn daughter Aurora.

Catalabutte, the King's loyal minister, is checking the invitation list to make sure that no one has been forgotten. The good fairies, led by the Lilac Fairy, have been invited to be godmothers to the little Princess. Upon her they bestow magical gifts, blessing her with every imaginable virtue so that someday she can marry the perfect prince. This, in turn, will seal the security and happiness of the kingdom.

Just as the ceremony is coming to a happy conclusion, the evil fairy Carabosse arrives and, in revenge for being left off the invitation list, declares that the Princess will prick her finger with a spindle and die.

Averting this tragedy, the Lilac Fairy promises that Aurora will not die, but will instead fall into a deep sleep that will last a hundred years or more. At the end of that time, a king's son shall awaken her with a kiss.

King Florestan at once forbids all persons in the kingdom to keep a spindle, under penalty of death.

ACTI

The Spell: Sixteen years later in the Castle Garden

It is Princess Aurora's sixteenth birthday and princes from the four corners of the earth seek her hand in marriage.

At the height of the celebration, Carabosse, disguised as an old woman, presents Aurora with a spindle wrapped in a bouquet of flowers. Unaware of the danger, Aurora pricks her finger and collapses, as if dead. Carabosse reveals herself in triumph and vanishes. Just in time the Lilac Fairy appears and casts a spell of sleep over the entire kingdom. She tells the King and Queen that all will be well and the son of a King will break the spell with a kiss.

ACT II Prince Désiré's Journey: More than a century later

Prince Désiré is on a walk near the river with members of his court. Distractions of music, merriment, and young ladies do nothing to alter his melancholic mood. As the court is leaving, the Prince realizes he is at a crossroads. He must choose between returning to his life in the court or stay in the mysterious forest. The Prince decides to stay. The Lilac Fairy appears and grants him a vision of Aurora's beauty. He declares his love for the Princess and is led to the castle where, guarded by Carabosse, Aurora sleeps. Together, the Prince and the Lilac Fairy's magic defeat the evil Carabosse. The Prince awakens Aurora with a kiss and the spell is broken.

ACT III The Wedding Celebration

The whole kingdom celebrates the wedding of Prince Désiré and Princess Aurora. The guests include fairy tale characters who present their stories as gifts to the royal couple. Prince Désiré and Princess Aurora are crowned with glorious fanfare, and their reign of light begins.



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GUEST CONDUCTOR'S BIOGRAPHY



BEAUTRICE AFFRON

Beatrice Jona Affron joined Philadelphia Ballet, formerly Pennsylvania Ballet, in 1993 as the assistant conductor. In 1997 she became the company's music director. Beatrice has conducted numerous ballets by George Balanchine in addition to other classics, including Giselle, The Firebird, Romeo and Juliet, and The Sleeping Beauty. In 2004, she led the world premiere of Christopher Wheeldon's Swan Lake.

A graduate of Yale University, Beatrice studied conducting with Robert Spano and with Pascal Verrot at the New England Conservatory, where she later served on the faculty. She led the national tour of Philip Glass' Les Enfants Terribles in 1997. In 2002, Beatrice received international attention while

conducting the world-premiere performances of Glass and Mary Zimmerman's *Galileo Galilei* at Chicago's Goodman Theater as well as on tour to London's Barbican Theatre. Prior to this, she conducted the Boston Lyric Opera and Chicago Opera Theatre productions of Glass' *Akhnaten*. In 2005, she made her debut with the Glimmerglass Opera conducting a Donizetti's *Lucie de Lammermoor*.

Beatrice's other engagements include Dominick Argento's Miss Havisham's Fire with Opera Theatre Saint Louis, Strauss' Die Fledermaus with Boston Lyric Opera, as well as Hansel and Gretel and The Tender Land at the New England Conservatory. She has conducted both dance and opera productions at the Boston Conservatory, as well as concerts with Boston's Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra and the Boston Landmarks Orchestra. With Philadelphia Ballet, Beatrice has toured to the Kennedy Center and the National Arts Center of Canada. She has appeared with Atlanta Ballet, Boston Ballet, Miami City Ballet, and Nashville Ballet. This is Beatrice's second appearance with Oklahoma City Ballet.



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
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ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES



JONATHAN BATISTA Guest Principal Dancer Jonathan Batista is from Rio De Janeiro, Brazil. He trained on scholarship at the English National Ballet and attended summer courses at Miami City Ballet and The Royal Ballet School on scholarship. He joined the National Ballet of Canada as an apprentice in 2012 before joining Boston Ballet as a member of the corps de ballet in 2013. In 2016, he joined Cincinnati Ballet as a soloist and in 2017, Oklahoma City Ballet as a principal. Mr. Batista joined Pacific Northwest Ballet as a soloist in 2021.

While at Boston Ballet, Mr. Batista performed featured roles in George Balanchine's *Emeralds* (Pas de Trois), Harald Lander's *Études* (Mazurka), and Marius Petipa's *La Bayadère* (Golden Idol). At Oklahoma City Ballet, he danced leading and featured

roles in Balanchine's The Four Temperaments (Phlegmatic); August Bournonville's La Sylphide (James); Robert Joffrey's Pas des Déesses; Jiří Kylián's Petite Mort (3rd Pas de Deux); Robert Mills' Romeo & Juliet (Mercutio), Swan Lake (Siegfried), The Firebird (Prince Ivan), The Nutcracker (Cavalier), The Little Mermaid, and The Means To Fly; Helen Pickett's Petals (Jonah); Cayetano Soto's Adam; and Septime Webre's ALICE (in wonderland).

AARON MOONEY Lighting Designer

Aaron Mooney is the Resident Lighting Designer and Professor of Lighting Design at Oklahoma City University, where he joined the faculty in 2012. He holds an MFA in Theatre Design from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts and a BA in Theatre Education from The University of Tulsa. Mooney has lit events in spaces as large as Radio City Music Hall (NYC), the Western Heritage Museum (OKC), and The Joint at the Hard Rock Casino (Tulsa), as well as spaces so small that they barely deserve to be called theatres.

Recent design credits include The Little Mermaid, The Firebird, Swan Lake, Giselle, La Slyphide, Our Private Rooms, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Romeo & Juliet, The Nutcracker, Exurgency (Oklahoma City Ballet); An American in Paris (Music Theatre Wichita); Noises Off, Death of a Salesman (Montana Shakespeare in the Parks); Pageant (Lyric OK); and King Lear (Oklahoma Shakespeare in the Park). Previous Lighting Designs for OCU include Spamalot, The Music Man, Crazy for You, Susannah, Side Show, The Marriage of Figaro, Sister Act, Three Sisters, Hairspray, Mr. Burns: A Post-Electric Play, As You Like It, RENT, Brigadoon, The Grapes of Wrath, South Pacific, Street Scene, 9 to 5: The Musical, Bernstein's MASS, and The Dialogues of the Carmelites.

In addition to all of his theatrical design work, Mooney has worked on exhibition lighting at the S.R. Guggenheim Museum, the National Academy of Design, the Cooper Hewitt National Design Museum, the National Museum of the Native American (NYC), and the Morgan Museum & Library. Fashion lighting in New York City includes Barneys New York, Prada, Armani, and Dolce + Gabbana. Mooney lives in OKC with his wife, Lisa, and his son, Eli.

COURTNEY CONNOR JONES

Courtney Connor Jones, from Charlotte, North Carolina, trained at the North Carolina Dance Theatre and Charlotte City Ballet before graduat-

ing from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts.

Connor Jones danced with Cincinnati Ballet for 11 seasons, and spent a summer in Russia where she performed in *Giselle*, *The Sleeping Beauty*, and *Swan Lake*. Throughout her career, she has performed feature roles including Odette/Odile in *Swan Lake*, The Chosen One in Adam Hougland's *Rite of Spring*, The Eaglet in Septime Webre's *ALICE (in wonderland)*, and Jumping Girl in George Balanchine's *Who Cares?*

Since joining Oklahoma City Ballet as a principal in 2017, Connor Jones has performed in Robert Mills' Swan Lake, The Nutcracker, The Little Mermaid, and The Means to Fly, as well as in Jiří Kylián's Petite Mort, Helen Pickett's Petal, and Cayetano Soto's Adam.

Connor Jones and her husband and former dancer Sam Jones have a young daughter, Gwyneth and a newborn son, Felix. She also creates custom jewelry and educates others on healthy eating and lifestyle habits in her spare time.



DAYOUNG JUNG

Hometown: Gyeongsang, South Korea Joined the Company in 2012

DaYoung Jung, from South Korea, trained at Moscow's Bolshoi Ballet Academy. She graduated with honors with a specialist degree in Ballet Pedagogy, and was a semifinalist in the Serge Lifar International Ballet Competition held in Donetsk, Ukraine in 2006.

Jung joined Oklahoma City Ballet in 2012, was promoted to soloist in 2014, and to principal in 2017. Her repertoire with Oklahoma City Ballet includes Robert Mills' The Nutcracker, Swan Lake, Romeo & Juliet, Beauty and the Beast, The Firebird, The Sleeping Beauty, and The Little Mermaid. She has performed the title roles in Giselle, Jacob Sparso's Cinderella, Septime Webre's ALICE (in wonderland), and August Bournonville's La Sylphide and performed lead roles in Toni Pimble's Mowgli – The Jungle Book Ballet, Paul Vasterling's Peter Pan, and Michael Pink's Dracula.

Jung has been featured in George Balanchine's Rubies and Serenade, Twyla Tharp's Nine Sinatra Songs, Robert Joffrey's Pas des Déesses, Ma Cong's Forgotten Memories, Sarah Tallman's If These Walls Could Talk, Jiří Kylián's Petite Mort, and Cayetano Soto's Adam.

ALEJANDRO GONZÁLEZ

Hometown: Caracas, Venezuela | Joined the Company in 2017 Sponsored by: Susan E. Brackett and Gregg Wadley

Alejandro González, from Caracas, Venezuela, began his training at the Gustavo Franklin School followed by Houston Ballet's Ben Stevenson Academy. While with Houston Ballet, he performed in John Neumeier's Yondering, and in Ben Stevenson's The Sleeping Beauty and The Nutcracker. He also danced in Stanton Welch's Long and Winding Road, The Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra, and Brigade.

González began with Oklahoma City Ballet in 2017 as a Summer Intensive student, then he was asked to join the studio company for the 2017/18 season. He was offered an apprenticeship in 2018, promoted to corps de ballet in 2019, and was named soloist in 2021.

His repertoire includes works by Robert Mills, August Bournonville, Jiří Kylián, Helen Pickett, Septime Webre, Cayetano Soto, and Michael Pink. González's favorite roles include Bell Boy in Michael Pink's *Dracula*, Nutcracker Prince in Robert Mills' *The Nutcracker*, and Conrad in *Le Corsaire* pas de deux.

González was awarded Gold Medalist in 2016 at CIBC (Concurso Internacional de Ballet Clasico), Gold Medalist in 2020 at MIBC (Miami International Ballet Competition), and featured in Pointe Magazine's "2020 Stars of the Corps".


